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ALMEDA Annual Report, 2024

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Introduction

2024 has been ALMEDA's first full calendar year of operation. During the year, we have welcomed new colleagues to the ALMEDA team, been involved in a number of scholarly and research activities, collected metadata on thousands of literary works in multiple languages, developed a working draft of our specific knowledge ontology for African literary works, and set up our data repository. What follows is a report on our activities in 2024.

Case-studies 2024

1 – 4 October 2024: Machakos, Kenya

Nicklas Hållén

As part of his case-study on **popular and street forms in Kenya**, Nicklas Hållén visited Machakos University in October where he co-organised a PhD and MA student workshop on popular cultural production in Kenya together with Dr. Charles Kebaya. The workshops are designed to help students plan and develop a research project and then co-write an article for publication based on this work. This is the second time Nicklas has run a workshop with this group of students, who have been working in groups on six different projects which will be collected in a co-authored book that is scheduled to be published in late 2025. The book will focus on Popular Cultural Production and the 2010 Kenyan Constitution. The final workshop, focusing on the book publication, will take place in the first half of 2025.

7 – 21 September 2024: Harare, Zimbabwe Pedzisai Maedza

Pedzisai Maedza's case-study focuses on **contemporary theatre festivals** in Harare, Zimbabwe. The festivals studied during this trip included the the Mitambo International Theatre Festival (which, due to resource issues, did not run this year), the Shoko Festival, the Oliver Mtukudzi International Festival of the Arts, amongst others. What became apparent in Pedzisai's research is the problem of sustainability for festivals in the on-going economic and regulatory difficulties in Zimbabwe: irregular and unreliable funding and demands for the pre-clearance of scripts by the censorship board creates significant programming difficulties for festival organisers. Despite these challenges the festival and theatre scene is remarkably resilient, with new venues and festivals emerging as quickly as established ones close down. This quickly changing organizational landscape presents challenges for creating metadata that maps the contemporary Zimbabwean theatre scene.

18 – 25 June 2024: Bamako, Mali Oulia Makkonen

Oulia Makkonen's case study focuses on **audiovisual remediations of Malian Kotéba theater**. During this research trip, in addition to setting up important contacts, she conducted research in the Institut des Sciences Humaines (ISH) de Bamako; the National Library of Mali, the National Museum of Mali, and The Women's Museum: Muso Kunda. At the ISH, Oulia was provided access to ISH's library catalogues and to their archive — consisting mostly of documents and audiotapes in boxes in a room. Together with ISH's interns, Oulia retrieved significant literary materials, including letters containing collected stories by teachers and pupils in the 1960s from all around Mali. These stories are handwritten in French (translated from local languages and folklore) and were sent to the radio in Bamako. A further dataset of some issues of the Revue semestrielle Sankoré, which includes materials in Bambara and French, was created.

19 September – 2 November 2024: Uppsala, Sweden Riaan Oppelt

Riaan Oppelt is based at Stellenbosch University, South Africa, and his case-study focuses on expressive forms in Afrikaaps. Before coming to Sweden to work more closely with the ALMEDA team, Riaan did archival research in Cape Town and Stellenbosch on early examples of Afrikaaps in the Afrikaans archive. During his time in Sweden, he focused on compiling a

dataset of Afrikaaps writers, rappers, playwrights and screenwriters. This dataset is the first part of a larger dataset on Afrikaaps creative texts, including poems, spoken word poetry, short stories, books, TikTok poems, radio and television dramas and music. Riaan is working towards a collaboration with the substantial Wikipedia archive, the Encyclopedia of South African Theatre, Film, Media and Performance, and the YouTube channel, the Stellenbosch Literary Project (SLiP).

Data Repository



ALMEDA is using a private Wikibase instance, running on Uppsala University's server, for the data repository. Instead of using Wikidata, a completely open database that can be edited by anyone, we decided to create our own wikibase instance that allows the project to maintain control over and ensure the quality of the project's data.

The Wikibase instance has been set up by digital engineers Adam Maen and Dann Wu and Dann is populating the repository with basic data (such as languages, country and city information, and other general classes). Gijs Aangenendt has been retrieving relevant items from existing Wikidata records, including author data, data about occupations, festival and awards.

We plan to start populating the database with our current datasets in January 2025. Thus far we have collected data on approximately 12 000 individual texts in a variety of languages, including Swahili, Xhosa, Ndebele, Zulu, Hausa, Luo, Bambara, Sotho, Afrikaaps, Chichewa, Portuguese, French and English.

Knowledge Graph/Ontology

A major outcome of this year's work has been the creation of a way to model information about literary works that allows for flexible and intuitive access to our data, which will operate multilingually, and which will counter some of the problems imposed on a wide range of literary data by standards that privilege the book object. We will publish this ontology in the new year after our information experts, Ursula Oberst and Dann Wu, put it through further testing.

After consultation with our advisors in February, we began work on our multilingual ontology with French, Portuguese, Swahili, Yorúbà, and Zulu. We are now planning to start opening up to a wider circle of languages.

Looking ahead

The ALMEDA repository will be ready for internal input of collected data in January 2025.

January sees the first of two ALMEDA-related PhD courses, 'Distant Reading World Literatures'. The second course on 'Literary Metadata from the 19th century to the Present' will run from September to November. These courses are free, online, and open to registered PhD students from anywhere in the world.

Adam Maen and Dann Wu will begin developing the search interface for the ALMEDA repository in the Spring Term of 2025.

Planned research trips include field research for Oulia Makkonen in Ivory Coast and Paris, for Gloria Ajami Makokha in Mombasa and Mwanza, Nicklas Hållén to Nairobi and Machakos, and Erik Falk to Uganda and Ashleigh Harris to South Africa.
